

When River City Voices was established in 2018, there was no professionally administered and artistically led symphonic choir in Parramatta. Our first operational year in 2019, thanks to initial funding from Create NSW, was an outstanding success. This was in large part due to our new chorister recruits who had more than matched our original call out for people who "are passionate and committed vocalists who love to be challenged and who strive for excellence."

Navigating the havoc, cancellations and constant changes wreaked by COVID throughout 2020/21, revealed additional attributes of our singers - adaptable, generous and resilient (traits significantly tested again throughout 2022 with the ever present waves of COVID and influenza!).

The loyalty displayed by choristers throughout this time meant that not only did we return with pre-COVID numbers but in fact, the choir grew in size from 32 singers at the end of 2019, to 46 in 2022.

As we emerged from the pandemic in to 2022, with expectations to pick up artistically where we had left off in 2019, River City Voices staff and singers embraced with determination and gusto every opportunity that presented itself exemplifying another recruitment aim, namely, a willingness and ability "to meet the demands of whatever choral works are thrown their way, sometimes in a hurry!".

And whilst River City Voices distinguishes itself as a professional organisation of excellence, we are also proud to be gaining a reputation for our positive, collaborative culture that has created a genuine community of caring, supportive and diverse individuals, linked together by their love of singing.

With only two fully productive years under its belt, River City Voices has already curated and participated in a wealth of activities and performances, engaging over 2000 artists, workshop participants and audience goers.

From festivals and large-scale concerts, to corporate and government gigs, with this year adding featured spots in two unexpected nationally broadcast television appearances - a product commercial and an airing on ABC's ArtWorks - RCV's list of performance achievements ever grows.

In developing our concert themes, *Luscious*, *Brave* and *Local*, the choir aims to deliver blockbuster classic choral favourites and lesser known musically delicious works to western Sydney audiences, as well as give voice to the stories and music of talented local and Australia-wide composers and artists.

CHAIR'S REPORT

"River City Voices has gone from strength to strength in 2022 despite the challenges that continue in delivering commercially and artistically viable performances during an ongoing pandemic."

Our initial performance for 2022 Songs of Destiny demonstrated our collaborative approach (thank you Willoughby Symphony and Willoughby Symphony Choir) and commitment to premiering new works with the first ever performance of Troy Russell's evocative and heart wrenching The Chant and Elizabeth Sheppard's awakening and re-birth in Gandangarragal: Blue Mountains Dreaming.

This performance was quickly followed by River City Voices headlining the first Blackheath Choral Festival in three years, and the immense joy of premiering our 'What the World Needs' program at Granville Centre together with the artists from Arts and Cultural Exchange's Club Weld program, featured on ABC's Art Works program in October.

From diverse artistic collaborations to commercial collaborations, partnering with Catch.com.au in its national ad campaign - getting colder, colder, then warmer, warmer, the singers of River City Voices have traversed these experiences with professionalism, enthusiasm and aplomb. We also represented Western Sydney at *From The Steps* celebrating 50 years of the Sydney Opera House with an engaging blend of non-traditional and audience favourites music – and it is always a good sign when the tour leads stop and engage to support you!

Finally, RCV presented what we think is an Australian, if not world, first – *Slam Messiah* with artists from WestWords presenting spoken word poetry to mesmerise, challenge and engage this most famous work from the choral canon to new audiences. River City Voices extended its reach through several Christmas performances in Parramatta's CBD to wrap up the year.

What has become clear in 2022 is how supportive, kind and daring River City Voices choristers are. There is a lot of 'can do' attitude, flexibility to challenges and changes, openness to entirely non-traditional choral experiences, and support and care for each other. As both a chorister and Chair, and veteran of many different choirs, River City Voices is really like no other choir in the most genuinely positive, ambitious and innovative way.

Our Board expanded in 2022, with Piroozi Desai and Robert Love contributing their enormous expertise and insight, and we farewelled Raquel Tracy. I would like to thank each for their generously contributing their time and expertise to our organisation.

River City Voices would not be possible without the tireless commitment and energy of our Artistic Director, Dr Sarah Penicka-Smith and our General Manager, Inara Molinari. Thank you also to our expanded team of conductors and pianists listed in this report!

It is testament to their vision for Western Sydney, and Parramatta's flagship symphonic choir that River City Voices continues to go from strength to strength and deliver choral music collaborations and performances that are in, of, and for Western Sydney - showing how the artistic culture of Western Sydney contributes so much to the Sydney, NSW, and Australian artistic landscape.

The continued support of new and engaged audiences at performances or through generous donations means the world to a new choir and on behalf of the Board, Artistic Director and choristers - thank you.

ARTISTIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT

"River City Voices' first full year of performances since the pandemic's beginning (and only the choir's second since it began) exceeded our expectations in terms of reach and scope."

Our amazing singers were straight back on the concert hall platform singing two extremely demanding German Romantic works, Brahms' 'Gesang der Parzen' and 'Schicksalslied'. These rarely-heard pieces demand a full symphony orchestra, so we were incredibly lucky to partner with the Willoughby Symphony, widely regarded as Australia's top community orchestra. For both the orchestra and its resident chorus, the Willoughby Symphony Choir, collaboration with another choir is not unusual; for it to repeat its performances in Parramatta was an innovation. This is a testament to the excellence of River City Voices, as well as the increasing importance of Western Sydney and its cultural offerings. As Willoughby Symphony's Associate Conductor, it was a personal and professional milestone for me that these two organisations collaborated so joyously, and with such a high standard.

The Parramatta 'Songs of Destiny' performances also saw the world premiere of the two works River City Voices commissioned, with support from JBS&G, from First Peoples Composers Elizabeth Sheppard and Troy Russell. Sheppard and Russell's music, and their introduction of it, was met with rapt attention by our audience. And although we did not fill the theatre at Parramatta Riverside, we were told that we were one of the bestselling shows that the theatre had had in those difficult times, quite an achievement for a classical music performance.

Sheppard and Russell's works were reprised to great acclaim at Blackheath Choral Festival. This was the first festival back since Covid, and also saw River City Voices' inaugural participation. As Festival Choir Director, it was another personal and professional joy for me to have River City Voices open the Saturday night concert, and then provide the backbone of the Festival Chorus. We had agreed on a program of Australian music, and as a result, with the support of Festival Director Christine Wheeler, we introduced both the Festival Chorus singers and the festival's audience to works from River City Voices' repertoire, including Elizabeth Sheppard's 'Gandangarragal', and Blue Mountains local Jerrah Patston.

We met Patston as part of our collaboration with A.C.E. and its program for neurodivergent musicians, Club Weld. 2022 saw the fruition of both our recording project and concert come together. Mastering the recording with ARIA-nominated Sound Artist Chris Hamer-Smith was a learning experience for us as we brought together several hundred tracks' worth of individual recordings, recorded either solo or in very small groups during Covid. The resulting album, 'What The World Needs', has more immediacy than some of the highly-produced choral recordings so prevalent today. The honesty and vibrancy of both the songwriters and choir make this a really unique collaboration.

The 'What The World Needs' performance at the Granville Centre in September was declared by many of the audience members I met to be a profoundly moving and uplifting experience. Clare Brown, the songwriter whose composition became the signature song for both the concert and the album title, is now a regular member of River City Voices.


Brown's piece received a repeat performance on the Sydney Opera House Forecourt in the dusk series 'From The Steps', launching the Sydney Opera House's 50th birthday celebrations. This rich a cappella program, for which we invited other Western Sydney singers to ensure our massed voices carried around the magnificent forecourt, included Alice Chance's 'Audience Choir', an opportunity for the audience (and their mobile phones) to participate in contemporary Australian a cappella choral music! Again, the feedback testified to our success, both in the quality of the singing, and the choice of repertoire.

2022 finished with our second chance to participate in Sydney Philharmonia Choir's biennial performance of Handel's 'Messiah'. Again, for a number of choristers, this was their first opportunity to sing on the Concert Hall platform of the Sydney Opera House. It will come as no surprise that a massed choral performance such as this was a happy hunting ground for Covid, influenza A, and other bugs, which threatened to derail our premiere of Slam Messiah' the following week. 'Slam Messiah', in collaboration with WestWords, was designed to introduce Western Sydney audiences who might not attend traditional choral performances to this masterwork and Australian choral Christmas tradition, in a way that was contemporary, relevant, and allowed for real-time comment on the issues of our day: three performance poets responded with their own work to select sections of the libretto. We had a difficult decision to make over whether to continue with the performance having lost almost half our singers, but proceeded with augmenting singers from a number of local choirs. While musically the performance did not reach the heights it would have if we had been full strength, again the audience response justified the risk we took in attempting to broaden the appeal of this beloved work to new audiences. Many first-timers attended, and those Messiah 'tragics' who also attended said that it helped them to view the work in an entirely new light.

Along with the excitement and challenges of preparing for our first (but not to be our last) TV commercial, 2022 was a mammoth year of which the choir should be very proud.

My thanks to Inara Molinari, Catherine Dolle-Samuel and the entire River City Voices board for enabling us to push boundaries and continue to grow. I would also like to thank my partner in crime, Su Choung, and all of the other artistic staff and collaborators who helped get us through the year in such fine style.

After two years enduring program cancellations, on again/off again online Zoom, all weather outdoor, small group indoor, sectional, and finally face-to-face rehearsals, it was with a mix of excitement and trepidation that River City Voices embarked on its "near normal" 2022 season. And what a way to restart!

Although the choir has grown in number since the end of 2019, it is not yet large enough to tackle major choral works by Brahms, and with depleted reserves due to COVID-19, had insufficient resources to mount such an ambitious program on its own.

As Assistant Conductor for the Willoughby Symphony, RCV's Artistic Director Dr Sarah Penicka-Smith, was able to forge a collaboration that enabled RCV choristers to sing in Willoughby Symphony's Songs of Destiny program at The Concourse, Chatswood, and the Symphony Choir to join RCV for its version of Songs of Destiny the following weekend at Riverside Theatres.

River City Voices' program was unique in featuring the choir on its own for the first time since August 2019, singing the long-awaited world premiere performances of two new choral works. These stunning works by Indigenous composers Troy Russell (The Chant) and Elizabeth Sheppard (Gandangarragal:Blue Mountains Dreaming), both graduates of the Ngarra-burria: First Peoples Composers Program, were commissioned in May 2019 with support from environmental consultants JBS&G. Planned for performance in 2020, the first drafts could only be workshopped with only 5 singers in November 2020 (between COVID outbreaks). A planned performance in 2021 was postponed, and we collectively held our breaths for the May '22 performance as choristers and staff were still succumbing to COVID in larger than expected numbers, requiring singers to keep masking up for rehearsals.

Although tickets sales were very slow, a new sales trend post COVID, we managed to secure the largest audience for Riverside Theatres Main stage since COVID and larger than our sold-out Messiah in December 2019.



This incredible one-of-a kind performance was the culmination of River City Voices' 2020/2021 City of Parramatta funded recording project previously reported - **Welded Voices.** This project was a veritable lifeline throughout the COVID years, one that brought to life a fantastic collaboration with Parramatta's Arts and Cultural Exchange and its ground-breaking Club Weld program. Jerrah Patston and Sam Worrad headlined the first half of the concert performing songs from his extensive CD releases, with the second part featuring the live performance of album songs for the very first time with Club Weld singer/songwriters, performing alongside the choir - also a new experience.

The project also captured the imagination of the ABC's Art Works program who filmed and produced a story featuring Club Weld, attending and filming one of RCV's rehearsals with artists Sienna Acquaro, Nina Gotsis



As 2022 drew to a close, no-one would have imagined that COVID-19 and a new Influenza strain would simultaneously rear their heads such that, with only one week to go until River City Voices' final performance, more than a dozen choristers were off sick and cancellation loomed large.

Fortunately, singers from across RCV's choral network came on board and they quite literally saved the show!

Handel's *Messiah* originated from a complex tapestry of politics, belief, and social justice; its story spanning centuries and people. So, according to RCV's Artistic Director and conceiver of Slam Messiah, Dr Sarah Penicka-Smith, what better way to share its universal message to modern audiences than through the interpretive lens of dynamic young slam poets? "Handel was a very theatrical composer who loved a good story. We offered this new version not because we think the music is missing something, but because we wanted to offer new audiences a way in to one of the greatest choral works ever written."

Along with a shortened iteration, Sarah re-scored the work for chamber orchestra, including a real twist, replacing the much loved trumpets with oboe, played by Frank Giraldo, who "stunned in his solo sections"!

WHAT THE WORLD NEEDS

EP Launch

11 June 2022 | Parramatta

When River City Voices successfully received a Creative Economy Grant late 2020 from City of Parramatta Council for its collaborative project **Welded Voices**, little did anyone realise what a veritable lifeline this project would be.

The aim of the grant was to provide local organisations with financial and project support to weather the devastating economic impacts of COVID-19 in 2020 and re-emerge in 2021.

But as COVID-19 restrictions continued into 2021, with indeed a 4 month lockdown in Sydney, RCV's recording project, although extended beyond its original timeline, clearly demonstrated how well it could adapt to the prevailing circumstances whilst providing purpose and engagement for RCV staff, artists and choristers.

At the end of 2021, after online, small group and outdoor rehearsals, choristers finally made it into the recording studio of collaborator Arts & Cultural Exchange in Parramatta. In the recording booth was Aria-nominated producer extraordinaire, Chris Hamer-Smith and Sarah Penicka-Smith conducting through the recording booth window so the two to a room restriction could be maintained! A mammoth 270 tracks (43 choristers two at a time) were recorded just before Christmas with additional recording sessions early in 2022 for choristers who had missed out due to COVID.

The tracks were then expertly edited, and then mixed with Club Weld singer/songwriters' vocals, over the next few months, with mastered versions shared with the Club Weld musicians for their final input and sign-off. The end result being a one-of-a-kind EP.

Through ACE's arrangements with the ABC, a digital EP was created and licensed, necessitating album cover designs and thumbnail images (see below).


Because of the lockdown, some Club Weld musicians never met the choir in person. A listening party to launch the digital EP was hosted by A.C.E on 11 June to give choristers and musicians the chance to hear the finished songs for the first time. It was an emotionally moving night!

The hard copy albums were ready for sale at the What the World Needs Live concert on 11 September.

The Festival gave RCV choristers not only an opportunity to hear a range of different choirs and repertoire, but a chance to indulge in a weekend social getaway together!

When Artistic Director Sarah Penicka-Smith received an email about a possible advertisement appearance totally out of the blue, little did River City Voices choristers know what was ahead!! RCV, in this instance "the Croc Choir", was eventually selected to appear in Catch.com.au's quirky new national advertising campaign *Because*. As Marketing Director for Catch, Peita Golden said: "Engaging local talent such as River City Voices ensures the entire campaign is a true representation of the Aussie public".

Not only did choristers get to experience first-hand behind-the-scenes processes and personnel of the advertising industry's, but this project also ticked RCV's mission to engage in unexpected collaborations, shake some of the stereotypes about what a choir is, who sings in a choir and what they can do, as well as showcase our choristers' talents to a national audience!

In a feature article by Dallas Sherringham run in the Parramatta Times, chorister Belinda Huang had this to say: "We really embraced the chance to try something new and had a lot of fun doing it together. River City Voices is all about different people coming together to make music in an inclusive, collaborative way and I think it's amazing that we had this opportunity to have our voices out there and represent western Sydney on national television. Plus it's a bit of an in-joke now - we "croc-shuffle" on and off stage!"

The advertisement aired on 9 September on Channel 9 during the Eels game! It will run nationally for 12 months.

One of only 11 participating choirs from across Sydney performing over the 10 nights, River City Voices presented a 30 minute program featuring Australian composers, Clare Brown, Alice Chance (an audience participatory piece using mobile phones), Gordon Hamilton, Michael Kennedy, Andrew Schultz and Lisa Young, plus a well-known encore for fun - Cyndi Lauper's Time After Time.

Being an outdoor concert with no amplification, no wind protection and performed *a capella*, we were advised to gather a larger choir in order to amplify our voices. This provided RCV with a wonderful opportunity to invite talented community singers from across western Sydney to join in this once-in-a-lifetime experience, many of whom had previously participated in RCV workshops and the recent Blackheath Choir Festival, plus a few former choristers!

It had been a rather stormy week, with a few downpours on the day, but miraculously the wind dropped, the clouds cleared, and it was a brilliant evening for the 100 strong choir and audience alike!





PROGRAM

A combination of continuing COVID uncertainty and the need to eke out financial reserves has meant that this program continues to be on hold. Nevertheless, there were a number of opportunities for RCV to engage previous program participants, including Joanna Brooke leading the rehearsal below..



DEVELOPMENT REPORT

"One of the "virtues" of COVID-19 program cancellations was that time could be diverted to consolidating governance and development aspects of the organisation. With a full calendar of artistic activities back for 2022, time was once again stretched in this area but nevertheless advances made!"

Economy grant (Welded Voices project), and later, the Create NSW Organisational Grant obtained back in 2020. This grant, originally used to fund a part-time Development Manager, was varied no less than three times to accommodate the vagaries of COVID-19 during 2020/21. Funds were diverted across a range of activities, the final one being the May concert, Songs of Destiny. A comprehensive application supported by Council and local organisations was submitted in October 2021 to the Federal government's post-COVID funding initiative R.I.S.E. This application sought funding for RCV's envisaged Global Voices Festival to run in September 2022. Parramatta currently has no regular festival that specifically celebrates and showcases the voice in all its different genres. RCV sought to kickstart a festival with the hope that it would gradually

Notification of the outcome was delayed until March this year partly because grant rounds including RCV's, were unexpectedly merged, which meant that 700+ applicants across Australia sought \$290 million of which only \$20 million was

Following that outcome, an application for \$20K was submitted for a City of Parramatta Community Grants Creative Leveraging Grant for one of the events planned for the festival - Super Critical Mass Parramatta, a large scale community participatory music making event in one of Parramatta's most historic locations, Parramatta Gaol. Set to take place in September, it has been postponed until March 2023 due to the key artist's change in availability. Conditions of this grant require that RCV contribute 50% towards the project and so additional

funds to support the live performance of the recorded works from the Welded Voices project (RCV's second performance in 2022). The Board decided to "take a break" in 2022 from online campaigns conscious of member/donor fatigue and fallout from two years of COVID, instead focusing attention on new sponsors and encouraging company members to promote box office sales for our first complete artistic season since 2019. Nevertheless, RCV did make a general appeal for donations raising an incredible \$ 20K throughout the year to support 2023 operational and artistic expenses. RCV is particularly grateful to long-term supporters Ann Hordern and Seth Molinari for their incredibly generous donations at the end of 2022.

RCV also received an unexpected commercial engagement from advertising agency Sunday Gravy for Catch.com.au that earned \$11K for the organisation. Connecting with local organisations is also key to development. To that end RCV executive is building a relationship with Western Sydney University, continues its membership of Parramatta Chamber of Commerce and Western Sydney Arts Alliance, and maintains a collegiate relationship with local politicians, arts organisations (including the new Western Sydney Philharmonic) and City of Parramatta Council, as well as seeking new ones with local businesses. And as we started the year, we finish the year working on another grant application! This one a Create NSW Organisational Grant focused on supporting RCV's continued growth through planned capacity building activities in 23/24 and a succession strategy to transition the various roles currently undertaken by the General Manager's various volunteer roles into separate roles with paid personnel. Thank you for your continued support in helping to build what we believe is a truly inclusive, bold and unique arts organisation that proudly showcases the best of western Sydney talent!

OPERATING RESULTS

Activities for the 12 month period ending December 2022 resulted in a profit of \$11,790. Operating revenue for the financial year to 31 December 2022 was \$92,939.00 representing a 270% increase in operating revenue compared with the end of 2021.

STRATEGIC GOALS - 2018 - 2022

1. Raising awareness of the company's existence.


Commencing the year with a large collaborative program at Riverside Theatres, ensured that River City Voices heralded its return post-COVID in a significant and wide-reaching way. The momentum was maintained throughout the year with performances taking place in Parramatta and beyond, including at the Sydney Opera House, Blackheath Choir Festival, and of course on national television. Whilst we did not attain the \$3.3K Facebook post reach high received for last year's Open Rehearsal video, RCV did average a 1.5K reach across 10 separate Facebook posts for a variety of RCV activities throughout the year.

2. Chorister Recruitment

2022 began with a total of 41 singers, a few singers less than the beginning of 2021. With post-workshop auditions, chorister numbers peaked to 51, the largest cohort to date.

3. <u>Development</u>

RCV's General Manager resumed the role of Development Manager in 2022. Refer to the report on page 21.



SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

Nil significant changes.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS/ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

Whilst a full calendar of events was delivered in 2022, COVID-19 continued to exert its influence on rehearsals and performances with large scale chorister absences due to illness. Audiences have not consistently returned to pre-COVID numbers across all RCV curated events, and a new trend of last minute purchases, makes it difficult to manage ROI decisions and risks.

MEMBERS' GUARANTEE

The company is incorporated under the Corporations Act 2001 and is a company limited by guarantee. If the company is wound up the constitution states that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$10 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the entity. At the end of 2022 the number of members was 6.


BASIS OF PREPARATION

No provision for income tax has been raised, as the company is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

The directors have determined that the company is not a reporting entity because there are no users who are dependent on its general purpose financial reports. The company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the mandatory Australian Accounting Standards applicable to entities reporting under the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the directors have determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. The company was registered with the ACNC on 31 July 2018.
